One Year of the Black Sea Grain Initiative: Ukraine's Response to Russia's Hunger Games

July 22, 2023, marks one year since the signing of the **Black Sea Grain Initiative** initiated by Ukraine to stabilise the global food supply and decrease price volatility. Despite its intended purpose of delivering food from Ukraine to the world's most vulnerable regions and mitigating the worsening global food crisis caused by Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, Russia has managed to turn even this crucial global initiative into a tool of blackmail.

On July 17, 2023, Russia halted the Black Sea Grain Initiative from July 18, 2023. This action by Russia is yet another deliberate move in its hunger games that will provoke a rise in prices on the global food

and drones. Russia deliberately strikes Ukrainian cities, which are vital for global food security, in order to achieve its political goals. While Russia has failed to uphold its obligations under the agreement with the UN and Türkiye, Ukraine's commitment to the agreement remains intact.

Together with other factors, it had a positive long-term effect. In June 2023, the prices were 23.4% lower than in March 2022, when Russia started the blockade of the seaports.

Russia's deliberate sabotage and blackmail tactics have disrupted the initiative by delaying inspections of ships and blocking ports in an attempt to advance its own agenda. By violating the agreement's terms, Russia has again proved to be an unreliable partner in fulfilling commitments. This was exemplified by Russia's full blockade of Ukraine's Pivdennyi seaport on April 29, 2023. Consequently, the functioning of
